

## Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual & Transgender Pride Month Booklist June 2014

Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Pride Month is celebrated to commemorate the contributions of gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender people in the United States and around the world. In 1999, President Bill Clinton issued a presidential proclamation designating June as Gay and Lesbian Pride Month to mark the thirtieth anniversary of the Stonewall Uprising in New York City the night of June 27, 1969. Themes are selected each year by various organizations including the Library of Congress.

Other dates are also commemorated. The last Sunday in June is celebrated as Gay Pride Day. In 1994, a coalition of education-based organizations in the United States designated October as LGBT History Month. The 11<sup>th</sup> of October is recognized internationally as National Coming Out Day, an awareness day that originated in 1988 in the United States for coming out and discussions for and about lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people.



(*Jeanette Winterson*) Alice Nutter fights for justice when a group of Pendle women are accused of witchcraft during the reign of England's James I, when being Catholic



was considered an act of treason and the Latin High Mass is comparable to the satanic Black Mass.


## Fire Year: Stories

*(Jason Friedman)* Jason K. Friedman investigates art, sexuality, love, and religion in seven unconventional and engrossing short stories. A gay man attends his high school reunion in Savannah, where he's pursued by the now-married former football star. An awkward teenager grapples with notions of God and girls at his bar mitzvah. A moving picture of the trials religious, cultural, and sexual minorities experience in Georgia and the Deep South.



## Golden Boy: A Novel

*(Abigail Tarttelin)* Presenting themselves to the world as an effortlessly excellent family, successful criminal lawyer Karen, her Parliament candidate husband, and her intelligent athlete son, Max, find their world crumbling in the wake of a friend's betrayal and the secret about Max's intersexual identity.



## Hild: A Novel


*(Nicola Griffith)* Hild is a young woman at the heart of the violence, subtlety, and mysticism of the early Middle Ages—all of it brilliantly and accurately evoked by Nicola Griffith's luminous prose. 
## The Two Hotel Francforts: A Novel


## Taken By the Wind



## The Wild Beasts of Wuhan: An Ava Lee Novel

(Ian Hamilton) Wong Changxing, a rich Chinese powerbroker, has just been bilked out of \$100 million in an elaborate art forgery con. His one hope of recovering the money, and of saving face, is Ava Lee--a forensic accountant with a talent for tracking down untraceable funds. With the help of her mentor, the Triad-connected Uncle, Ava traces the provenance of the meticulously forged paintings to Denmark, the Faroe Islands, New York, and London.




## NONFICTION

(Dan Savage) In *American Savage*, Dan Savage writes on topics ranging from marriage, parenting, and the gay agenda to the Catholic Church and sex education.




## Blue Is the Warmest Color

(Julie Moroh) Clementine, a high school student, has an average life: she has friends, family, and the romantic attention of the boys in her school. When her openly gay best friend takes her out on the town, she wanders into a lesbian bar where she encounters Emma: a punkish, confident girl with blue hair. Their attraction is instant and electric, and Clementine finds herself in a relationship that will test her friends, parents, and her own ideas about herself and her identity. This graphic novel was adapted into a movie with the same title in 2013.



## The Book of Matt: Hidden Truths about the Murder of Matthew Shepard


(Stephen Jimenez) What role did crystal meth and other previously underreported factors play in the brutal murder of gay college student Matthew Shepard? *The Book of Matt* is a page-turning cautionary tale that humanizes and de-mythologizes Matthew while following the evidence where it leads, without regard to the politics that have long attended this American tragedy.


## Calling Dr. Laura: A Graphic Memoir


## Darling: A Spiritual Autobiography

(*Richard Rodriguez*) Examines international religious violence, growing public atheism in the West, and the author's religious rejection for his homosexuality, exploring subjects ranging from Jerusalem and Silicon Valley to Lance Armstrong and Mother Teresa.




## Fairyland: A Memoir of My Father

(*Alysia Abbott*) Describes the author's life being raised by her widowed, bi-sexual father in the liberating cultural mecca of San Francisco in the 1970s and 1980s and how AIDS began claiming the lives of their friends and eventually her father.



## Forcing the Spring: Inside the Fight for Marriage Equality

(*Jo Becker*) Details how a small but determined group of political and media insiders took the fight for marriage equality all the way to the Supreme Court. Gay activists and Hollywood liberals joined together to enlist attorneys Ted Olson and David Boies--the opposing counsels on the Supreme Court's infamous *Bush v. Gore* ruling--to bring a controversial legal case against Proposition 8 before the highest court in the land.




## Gay Parenting

(*Beth Rosenthal*) This book explores the topics relating to children raised by gay or lesbian couples by presenting varied expert opinions that examine many of the different aspects that comprise these issues. The viewpoints are selected from a wide range of highly respected and often hard-to-find sources and publications. Allows the reader to attain the higher-level critical thinking and reading skills that are essential in a culture of diverse and contradictory opinions.




## Rainbow Theology: Bridging Race, Sexuality, and Spirit

## The Soundtrack of My Life




## Warrior Princess: A U.S. Navy Seal's Journey to Coming Out Transgender


## What's Wrong with Homosexuality?


## We Do!: American Leaders Who Believe in Marriage Equality


### Beautiful Music for Ugly Children

(Susan Kuklin) Author and photographer Susan Kuklin met and interviewed six transgender or gender-neutral young adults and used her considerable skills to



*(Clark, Kristin Elizabeth)* Living a seemingly idyllic existence as a star wrestler and video game aficionado, Brendan endures the psychological torment of having a secret transgender identity while his loving girlfriend, Vanessa, struggles to protect their relationship.




## Just Between Us

*(J. H. Trumble)* Seventeen-year-old Luke falls for new guy Curtis, who is secretly HIV positive, but when the two become involved, Curtis has trouble distancing himself from Luke in order to protect him from infection.



## Openly Straight




## Queer: The Ultimate LGBT Guide for Teens


## The Summer Prince


## Two Boys Kissing

*(David Levithan)* This award-winning novel, based on true events, is the story of Harry and Craig, two 17-year-olds who are about to take part in a 32-hour marathon of kissing to set a new Guinness World Record—all of which is narrated by a Greek Chorus of the generation of gay men lost to AIDS. While the two increasingly dehydrated and sleep-deprived boys are locking lips, they become a focal point in the lives of other teen boys dealing with languishing long-term relationships, coming out, navigating gender identity, and the internet.

*(Eric Marcus)* Offers answers to questions young readers might ask about gay people, whether those questions concern a friend, a family member, or themselves.




## JUVENILE FICTION and NON-FICTION


## Antonio's Card

(*Michael Willhoite*) A young boy discusses his divorced father's new living situation, in which the father and his gay roommate share eating, doing chores, playing, loving, and living.


## Heather Has Two Mommies

(*Patricia Palacco*) Three young children experience the joys and challenges of being raised by two mothers.




## King & King & Family

(*Linda de Haan*) When the queen insists that the prince get married and take over as king, the search for a suitable mate does not turn out as expected.




## Mommy, Mama, and Me


## My Princess Boy: A Mom's Story About a Young Boy Who Loves to Dress Up

## See You at Harry's






## DVD

The following selected films provide insight into Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgendered history, social issues, and culture in America and throughout the world with drama and humor. Although not rated by the MPAA, many of the not rated films are the equivalent of an R rating.

### **American Experience: Stonewall Uprising**

This historical PBS documentary tells the story of the infamous Stonewall Uprising -- a police raid launched on a Mafia-run gay bar in Greenwich Village in the early '60s - - not for its ties to the Mafia, but for its ties to the gay community. Saddled with prejudice and oppression at every other turn in conservative society, the gays and lesbians did something unprecedented in response to the raid, by fighting back.




### **Any Day Now (2013)** (Rated R)

When a teenager with Down syndrome is abandoned by his mother, a gay couple takes him in and becomes the loving family he's never had. But when their living arrangement is discovered, the men are forced to fight a biased legal system to save the life of the child they have come to love as their own.



### **Behind the Candelabra** (Rated R)

This HBO Films drama recreates the glittering private world of Liberace, the flamboyant, phenomenally successful entertainer whose extravagant costumes, trademark candelabra, and elaborate stage shows made him the most bankable entertainer of his time. Based on the book by the same title by Scott Thorson.



### **Farewell, My Queen [Les adieux a la reine]** (Rated R)

Sidonie, who serves as reader to Marie Antoinette and displays a singular romantic devotion to the queen, witnesses the final days of the French Revolution from inside the walls of the Palace of Versailles. The film is seen from Sidonie's point of view, and the story takes place over the course of four days. Based on the novel with the name title by Chantal Thomas.

## Jitters (Not rated)

A 16-year old Icelandic boy's first kiss with another boy gives him "jitters"--feelings he can't deny. This is a well-written film that captures the confusion and excitement of being a teenager, with an attractive ensemble cast. The film follows the lives of several teens and the challenges they face, in particular with their parents.




## Prayers for Bobby

Sigourney Weaver stars in this emotional true story about a 1970s religious suburban housewife and mother who struggles to accept her young son Bobby being gay. What happens to Bobby is tragic and causes Mary to question her faith; ultimately this mom changes her views in ways she never could have imagined her views in ways that she never could have imagined.



## Romeos (Not rated)

A transgendered 20 year old gets swept up in the Cologne gay scene, and struggles to reveal his deepest secret after meeting the masculine boy of his dreams in this compassionate tale of sexual awakening. Lukas is a pre-op transgendered individual who was born female. Placed in a residential hall filled with female nurses as part of his community service, Lukas is struggling with the complexities of social acceptance. He catches the eye of Fabio, a handsome, outgoing guy possessing every ounce of confidence Lukas lacks. Meanwhile, Lukas realizes that in order to be truly accepted by Fabio, he must somehow find a means of revealing his most intimate secret.



## What Happens Next (Rated R)

After rich businessman Paul Greco retires early, his imperious sister Elise tries to get him to settle down with the woman of her choosing. But Paul seems more interested in developing his friendship with Andy, a charming young man he meets at a dog park.
